Updates: Tree Activism in Seattle? No. Time. Like. The. Present.

<u>Breaking News (as of July 5)</u> - We have passed a big hurdle. On Wednesday Councilmember Sally Bagshaw came to the Seattle Urban Forestry Commission. She told the Commission that she met with Mayor Jenny Durkan on Monday and the Mayor has agreed to move forward this year with Councilmember Bagshaw and the City Council on working to pass an update to SMC 25.11 - the Tree Protection Ordinance.

Things are coming together <u>and if we continue to let the Council and Mayor know</u> <u>that the people in Seattle urgently want a stronger tree ordinance that works</u>, we can make it happen!

An initial step is to thank Mayor Durkan and Councilmember Sally Bagshaw for moving this legislation forward now, before it's too late. Thank them by sending an e-mail to

Essential to this progress was the work of the Seattle Urban Forestry Commission (UFC) in providing a draft revision of the Council's last tree ordinance draft to Councilmember Sally Bagshaw as she requested. *When Councilmember Bagshaw was asked on Wednesday if she saw any problems with the draft, she responded with a no*. She gave the UFC permission to circulate the UFC draft, which is linked below. The first 5 pages of the document are an outline of what is in the draft, followed by the actual UFC draft ordinance:

Draft UFC revision to Council D7 draft - Tree Regulations: <u>Tree and Urban Forest Protection and Land Use Regulations</u>

The plan moving forward is for the Council and City Departments to

- 1) Review the draft (including a parallel review by the City Attorney);
- 2) Complete a SEPA review;
- 3) File the draft with the Council Budget and Neighborhood Committee chaired by Councilmember Bagshaw by the beginning of September;

4) Circulate the draft for public comment including holding forums in September in both North and South Seattle;

5) Put adequate funding in the budget to fund implementation of the ordinance; and

6) Pass the Legislation in the first two weeks of December after the budget is adopted.

So there are a lot of steps in this process, but it is moving. We can do this but we need to coordinate our efforts as tree advocates so that we can speak in unison and work in unison to be most effective.

In addition to our priority being updating and successfully passing the Tree Ordinance as provided above, there are many new tree-activist groups on our list, and they are being included in the outreach from this newsletter.

There have also been some really positive studies of late on trees' ability to help address climate change, linked below. And even with an election coming later this year that will likely see huge turnover on the SeaCC starting next year, there's at least a few candidates now talking about Seattle Trees – it's our job to make sure they ALL do.

So as always, we offer the 'what can I do' - but it's more diverse than before, with a lot of different things going on and different possibilities.

1) **Tree Ordinance work** – See above. Also, here's the ongoing <u>list of actions you can</u> <u>take</u> and points to include, including contact info.

Of special note is the <u>Guardian article</u> about the huge possibilities for helping climate change through planting trees in a recent study, **but**, please make sure to include that PROTECTING trees is just as important – **existing trees already have** a huge positive effect on climate change, carbon capture and habitat - We need BOTH.

6) <u>The Last 6,000</u>, a new **Plant Amnesty** effort, is a civic campaign to locate Seattle's remaining majestic trees. Have you located a <u>majestic</u> tree, or a few, in your neighborhood or around the city? Share them with the campaign, and they will count and map them!
